

UNR to highlight humanities, liberal arts in new ads

In its second round of TV and newspaper ads beginning this month, the University of Nevada, Reno will emphasize teaching and the humanities instead of research.

Professors and students criticized administrators after the campaign began tast fall. They complained the ads ignored the humanities and liberal arts and emphasized research over teaching.

But members of the Curtis & Rogers advertising firm heading the one-year \$250,000 campaign said they weren't ignoring anyone.

"All along we've wanted to focus on every different college," Amy Brazil, a Curtis & Rogers account supervisor, said. "Last time we hit all the harder sciences and this time we wanted to hit on the softer sciences."

Dad of 2 victims angered former Cub leader won't receive jail time

A former Cub Scoul leader charged with molesting several of his Reno pack members was given probation Tuesday, enraging the father of two of his victims.

Hay Opfer, 41, received five years of probation for one count of lewdness with a child under 14. He could have been sentenced to a maximum of 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine for the felony charge.

Under terms of the probation, Opter must not come in contact with any children under age 16 except for his own son and a friend of his son.

"I'm very sorry for the burt that has been caused to all the people involved in this incident," he told Washoe District Judge Robin Wright.

But Opter's applogy was little comfort to a father of two of the victims. The parent said he was outraged at the sentence and that the judge should have given Opter at least one year in Jall.

"They (officials in the District Attorney's office) roll over and play dead," he said. "And how can a judge sit on the stand and make a decision like this?

"It's gross, I can't even believe it."

Deputy District Allorney Ron Rachow said his office had agreed to go along with the recommendation reached by the Department of Parole and Probation and he was bound to follow that agreement. The department made the recommendation after interviewing Opfer, the victims and their parents, Rachow said.

"Whether you agree with it or not, it's the judge's call," Rachow said.

The father said he and the parents of another victim bave filed a lawsuit against Opfer and the Cub Scouts for not checking Opfer's background before allowing him to be a pack leader.

Opter pleaded guilty Jan. 29 to one count of lewdness with a child under 14 just before he was to face trial. He was originally charged with six counts, but three were dismissed last October.

Washoe County authorities charge that between September 1988 and May 1989, Opfer invited the Cub Scouts to his hot tub and would rub their backs, thighs and stomachs in a way that sexually aroused him. The boys ranged in age from 10 to 13.

Opfer's lawyer, Martin Wiener, said Opfer has never even had a parking ticket. Wiener played down the sex charges, saying that on a scale of one to 10, the seriousness of Opfer's crimes was less than one.

"We have two incidents of football tackling and one in a hot tub," Wiener said. Rachow said the charges were serious

Rachow said the charges were serious and that Opfer took advantage of the youths, who had come to his house to work off unpaid Scouting dues.


