

Subject: Report of meeting with Mr. Harvey Blow

Executive Board member John Barr and I met with Mr. Harvey Blow at approximately 4:15 PM on Thursday, June 23rd. This meeting took place at his residence at Shelburne, Vermont.

Realizing that two or more people, who were identified as his and were also in the house we asked if he would prefer to go somewhere more private. Rather than responding to the offer he asked, "What's this all about?" Since the other individuals were out of sight we stated that we were there to follow up on the recent decision by the troop committee and to insure that he understood BSA's position on this matter and to return his membership fee. Shortly thereafter he stated that he had been told, at the committee meeting that he was told if he were to reapply in a year or two that he could come back into the program. I asked him who had told him this and he replied, "the president". We assumed that this referred to the leadership of the troop committee.

At this point, I stated that the individual who said that did not have the authority to make such a statement as membership is granted by the national BSA organization.

I then read the letter from Mr. Kumbera. Following this I reemphasized that Mr. Kumbera was the individual that he would need to address his appeal to, if he desired to do so. I indicated that the address on the letterhead was the one to use in mailing that request. Mr. Blow showed no apparent interest in filing an appeal.

I then handed nim the check which he said belonged to the troop as they had paid his registration. I stated that my instructions were to give the check to him. To which he replied that the money was not his. Finally he suggested that he endorse the check thereby acknowledging receipt and that I then have the check deposited into Troop 602's account. Mr. Barr and I determined that this presented the most viable and expeditious alternative and therefore agreed. Mr. Blow then endorsed the check and returned it to me.

I then asked Mr. Blow if he had any questions. Rather than answering the question, he began a discussion of how people failed to give credit to someone who has paid his debt to society. He mentioned a time span of eight years without referring to himself. He then mentioned his lawyer, pending actions, discrimination cases, etc. He did state that he was "not after the Boy Scouts" but rather another unnamed individual.

Following this we thanked him for his time and parted cordially. Mr. Blow retained the letter and we retained the signed check as evidence of his receipt thereof.

Mr. Blow remained cordial throughout our meeting.



### Facing up to abuse

here's a sad but urgent lesson for parents in the alleged case of sexual abuse at Camp Abnaki last summer. No institution, however responsible, can absolutely guarantee the safety of children in its care.

But what's a parent to do? Parents know they can't cloister their children forever within the family walls for safety's sake.

The answer's an uncomfortable one. Parents have a hard enough time accepting the reality of child sexual abuse themselves, let alone talking to their kids about it. The truth is that the safest child is the child with knowledge — the child whose parents have taught her the difference between good touching and bad touching, the child whose parents have empowered him to say "no" to an intrusive adult.

That being said, it's also true that child care institutions carry a heavy responsibility to protect their charges. And, when something goes wrong, they owe parents the fullest, most open explanation of what happened.

Camp Abnaki and its parent, the YMCA, deserve a measure of criticism on both counts, but particularly for their reflexive defense when abuse allegations became public last week. In its first public response, the Y seemed more concerned about bad publicity than with providing parents complete information.

Abnaki officials had no knowledge last summer of the alleged sexual abuse of an eight-year-old camper by archery instructor Thomas Cook; the child didn't complain until this winter. But, the Y acknowledged to police, two other campers did complain about Cook while camp was in session.

Grand Isle State's Attorney Christopher Micchiche filed a criminal charge against Cook and made the facts public. He also fired a blast at the Y for failing to report the allegations to authorities.

The Y curled up like an armadillo, armor outward. Its statements were long on generalities about concern for children and the Y's stellar reputation; the statements were short — in some a cases devoid — of detail about how the Y had handled the summer incident.

The public was left to speculate that the Y had lightly dismissed the two campers accusations and culpably allowed Cook to continue working with children.

Executive Director Dave Johnson belatedly offers a fuller explanation that indicates the Y tried hard to carry out its responsibilities: the boys' accusations were vague and hesitant; they were made just six days before camp ended; camp officials investigated thoroughly, interviewing campers, counselors, other staff and Cook himselfu.

The probe found no scrap of evidence of abuse, Johnson says, so the matter wasn't referred to authorities. Instead, Cook was allowed to continue teaching archery for the few remaining days, under increased supervision. From Johnson's account, the decision didn't expose any child to risk.

Nevertheless, parents probably would feel better if Abhaki had erred on the side of suspending the archery instructor—a lesson Johnson says the YMCA has learned. "In the future, we'll err on the side of protecting children," Johnson said.

Parents avoid talking to children about sexual abuse for fear of destroying their trustful openness to the world. The YMCA avoided openness last week out of the same instinct — fear of destroying trust.

For both, the lesson is that confronting sexual abuse frankly and openly can preserve trust, and the security of both children and parents
