Judge revokes bail in sexual contact case

A man awaiting trial on charges of child sexual abuse went to jail Tuesday after a judge heard testimony that he had approached young boys and had been drinking in violation of a bail condition.

Martin J. Comer, 44, of Bangor, a tormer Boy Scout leader, was indicted in October on two counts of unlawfiff sexual contact and one count of assault. He was freed on bail on conditions that included avoiding alcoholic beverages and having no unsupervised contact with minors.

A former U.S. Postal Service employee, Comer recently has worked for a Bangor taxi company.

A boy who volunteers for the Salvation Army testified that, as he was tending a kettle used to collect donations outside the Bangor Mall, Comer approached him and asked him to watch his taxi while he went inside. Comer left the boy his business card, said the youth, and said to call him after getting his mother's permission and maybe they could do something together.

Nancy Toner of Bangor testified that Comer had responded to an advertisement she had placed seeking a baby sitter for her four sons and had called her persistently about the job. At one point he went to her house, she said, speaking to her sons in the yard before entering.

Comer admitted that he had suggested that the Salvation Army youth contact him, but stressed that it was only with his mother's permission. He testified that he first had the impression that the baby-sitting job involved helping the mother after school, and that he decided independently not to pursue it when he realized it would mean he would have unsupervised contact with the children.

He admitted taking a drink while free on bail, but said that his understanding of the bail condition wasthat he not drink to excess.
