

Davis sentenced for i. Sidents at Kurn Hatti

BRATTLEBORO — Windham District Court Judge Robert Grussing III Tuesday sentenced Mark W. Davis, 27, to two years imprisonment and a lengthy period of probation on eight counts of lewd and lascivious conduct with students at the New England Kurn Hattin Homes in Westminster.

In sentencing Davis, Grussing stuck to the plea agreement hammered out in March between prosecutors and Davis' defense attorney, which led to Davis entering pleas of no contest to the eight charges. In exchange for Davis' pleas, the state agreed to drop a ninth charge of lewd and lascivious conduct. In addition, prosecutors agreed not to bring any further charges against Davis, who, by his own account, according to court records, was implicated in the molestation of up to 17 students at the school over a four-year period.

Windham County Deputy State's Attorney Karen R. Carroll told the court the state was willing to abide by the terms of the plea agreement reached in March. That agreement specified that Davis be sentenced to one to five years imprisonment on two counts of lewd and lascivious conduct, all suspended but for one year on each count, and for two to five years on the six remaining counts, with all time suspended.

In addition, the state stipulated that Davis complete a sex offender's treatment program, refrain from any contact with minors without appropriate supervision, and pay a portion of the

counseling expenses incurred or to be incurred by his victims.

Prior to sentencing, Grussing heard from the mother of one of Davis' victims, who told the court her family would never forget what Davis had done to her son. Kurn Hattin is a residential school for children of families in crisis, and the mother said Davis had victimized children who were already in an extremely difficult situation and made it worse.

But Carroll said she believed Davis had accepted his guilt and not tried to blame others. His attorney, Joel Deckler, agreed, saying Davis had been both "cooperative and contrite" from the beginning of the police investigation.

Their comments were echoed by Michelle Gerard of the Department of Probation and Parole, who said Davis had been exceedingly cooperative and had not denied his own responsibility for the incidents.

"He didn't blame the victims or try to minimize his own blame," she told Grussing. "I found him to be truly remorseful."

She said Davis would have an opportunity to participate in sex oftenders counseling while incarcarated, and would then have an opportunity to seek drug and alcohol counseling on an outpatient basis while on probation.

Davis also spoke before sentence was passed, saying he had been going to counseling and had stopped drinking.

stopped drinking.
"I think counseling taught me a lot of things I didn't know before or I didn't have the guts to face up to," he told Judge Grussing.

Grussing suid the sentence outlined in the plea agreement was appropriate, since it provided both punishment and an opportunity for rehabilitation. He then sentenced Davis to two consecutive sentences of one to five years on two counts, and two to five years on the six remaining counts, with those sentences suspended, to be served consecutive to the first sentence in order to allow for a lengthy period of probation.

Davis was arraigned in January following a Vermont State Police investigation into allegations that students at the Kurn Hattin boys' campus in Westminster had been molested. Davis, the spouse of a Kurn Hattin houseparent, had at one time worked at the residential school, but was not employed by Kurn Hattin at the time.

According to the police affidavit filed by Sgi. Myles Heffernan, Davis admitted to the allegations and agreed to cooperate in the investigation. Interviews were conducted with a number of students between the ages of 9 and 12, and nine charges of lewd and lascivious conduct were eventually lodged against him. Heffernan stated that Davis estimated he had inappropriately touched four students in 1986, when he worked at Kurn Hattin as a houseparent, and approximately another 13 students in 1988-69.

The affidavit also stated that Davis had told police he had been sexually abused as a child by two adult males on separate occasions.

"The defendant advised that his main motivation for these acts (of lewd and lascivious conduct) was anger toward the people that abused him as a child," Heffernan wrote.

Molestation ase yields plea bargain

BRATTLEBORO - The Windham County State's Attorney has approved a plea agreement for the man accused of molesting children at New England Kurn Hattin Homes in Westminster.

Court documents showed Mark W. Davis pleaded no contest last week to eight charges of lewd and lascivious behavior with a minor. In exchange, the state agreed to drop a ninth charge of lewd and lascivious behavior against Davis.

Prosecutors also agreed not to bring further charges against Davis in Windham District Court, according to court documents.

The state's attorney's office also outlined the terms of the sentence it would recommend for Davis on the eight charges. According to the terms of the plea agreement, prose-

tors will recommend a sentence of to five years imprisonment on ...e first two counts, all suspended but for one year on each count.

Prosecutors will also ask for twoto five-year sentences on the six remaining counts, all suspended.

If accepted by the judge at sentencing, this would mean a two-year term of imprisonment for Davis, to be followed by a period of two to five years under the supervision of the Department of Probation and Parole.

In addition, the plea agreement calls for Davis to participate in and complete a sex offender's treatment program, refrain from any contact with minors without appropriate adult supervision, and pay a portion of the counseling expenses incurred or to be incurred by his victims.

Davis was charged with seven counts of lewd and lascivious behavior in January, after Vermont State Police and the Department of Social and Rehabilitative Services conducted an investigation into allegations that students at the residential

Forner Kurn Hattie worker's husband faces lewd behavior charges

A former Kurn Hattin campus resident will be arraigned in Windham District Court Monday on seven charges of lewd and lascivious behavior involving children at the residential school, Vermont State Police at Rockingham said Friday.

Sgt. Miles Heffernan said Mark Davis, 26, whose wife worked as a houseparent at New England Kurn Hattin Homes, would face charges alleging improper touching of seven Kurn Hattin students, all boys between the ages of 9 and 11 years old. Heffernan said Mark Davis was not an employee of the school, but that he did reside on the Westminster campus. Davis is currently living out of state, Heffernan added.

Heffernan said investigation into Davis' activities began after Robert Morse, director of the boys' campus, informed police he had been told allegations that children were being molested. Police and personnel from the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services conducted interviews with the alleged victims, Heffernan said, and Davis was subsequently arrested.

Heffernan said Davis was arrested last month and released on citation on condition that he did not return to the Kurn Hattin campus or attempt to contact any of the children. The incidents involving the children are alleged to have occurred over the past year and one-half, Heffernan said.

Davis cooperated in the investigation, Hefferman said, as did the staff of Kurn Hattin.

New England Kurn Hattin Homes is a non-profit, charitable year-round home for boys and girls ages 6 to 14. Boys are housed on the main campus in Westminster, while girls reside on the Saxtons River campus. The school has been in operation since 1894 and accommodates a student body of over 100 children.

The students who live at Kurn Hattin generally come from families whose situations make it impossible for the children to remain at home. Approximately 80 percent of the students are placed there by their families, and the average length of

stay is three years.

Kurn Hattin is also an institution known for the unusually strong support and loyalty it receives from its alumni, both in terms of monetary donations and dedication to the school's mission. A number of key positions are staffed by former students, including the facility's executive director, David Maysilles, and boys' campus director Morse, who made the initial contact to police about Davis' alleged behavior with students.

Christopher Barry, deputy executive director for Kurn Hattin, said Friday that the school immediately took action after a complaint involving Davis was reported. That complaint was investigated by staff and reported to the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, as required by law, he said.

"Kurn Hattin has set strict policies and procedures which were followed, and, although they don't need to be invoked very often, they work," Barry said.

The school also has a screening process for employees, and tries to weed out potential employees who might create problems for students, according to Maysilles. However, that screening process does not extend to spouses of employees, who are also living on the campus, he said:

Maysilles said the state's investigation was continuing, and that no changes in policy would be made until that investigation was complete.

"We will definitely be assessing all the facts surrounding this case and then review our process to see if it needs to be revised," Maysilles said.

Maysilles added that the school was working with its consulting psychologist to determine what, if any, treatment or counseling should be provided for the students. This is not the first incident of its kind at Kurn Hattin, he said, but it is the first in over a decade.

Because the school attempts to provide — in addition to an education — a sense of family to its students, the current state of affairs is particularly hard to deal with, Maysilles added.

The man accused of molesting students at New England Kurn Hattin Homes was arraigned in Windham District Court Monday, where he denied seven charges of lewd and lascivious conduct with a child.

Mark W. Davis, 26, entered the not guilty pleas through his attorney, Joel Deckler of Springfield, and was released on condition that he not go to the Kurn Hattin campus or associate with any of the juveniles named in the complaints.

According to the affidavit submitted by Vermont State Police Sgt. Myles Hefferman of the Rockingham barracks, he and a representative of the Vermont Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services were called to the Kurn Hattin campus in Westminster on Dec. 18 by Robert Morse, director of the boys'campus. Morse told police that two students had complained of being molested by Davis, a former Kurn Hattin employee whose wife works at the campus as a houseparent.

"It was also learned that after the director, Mr. Morse, received this information and initiated an investigation, the defendant learned of this and left the area," Heffernan wrote.

Heffernan said that he, SRS representative Denis Coffman, and Morse interviewed all the available students at the cottage where Davis lived, on the suspicion that the two students who made the initial complaint were not the only alleged victims. Interviews were conducted with seven boys, all of them 9 or 10 years old, and all said that Davis had entered their rooms late at night and engaged in inappropriate touching, the documents revealed.

In many cases, the students said they pretended to be asleep when Davis entered their rooms, but on one occasion, according to the affidavit, Davis told a student, "Please don't teil anyone about my problem, I'm trying to get over it."

Following the round of interviews with students, Hefferman said police contacted Davis at his residence in Plymouth, Mass., and Davis agreed to meet with officers in Brattleboro the following day.

"The defendant advised that he began working as a relief house-parent at the Kurn Hattin Boys School in Westminster approximately three years ago," Heffernan's affidavit continued. "He advised that during that time he had three or four encounters with young male students at the school. The defendant gave ... the names of those students and attempts are presently being made to locate them for interview."

Davis then left the Kurn Hattin campus for several years, and during this time he married his present wife. The couple returned to Kurn Hattin in the summer of 1988.

"The defendant advised that approximately two months after returning he started sexually abusing the students there again," according to the affidavit. Heffernan wrote that Davis admitted to molesting one child at first, but that his activities soon escalated to include other Kurn Hattin students.

"The abuse not only occurred at the (Davis') cottage, but whatever other cottage he happened to be working at," Heffernan wrote. "The defendant advised that he would, on some nights, molest numerous victims. The number of victims would depend on the availability, the position in which the child was sleeping, and the risk that he would be taking."

Heffernan said Davis estimated that between 1986 and 1989 he molested 17 children. According to the affidavit, Davis provided police with the names of 11 students he allegedly abused. None of the 11 students has been interviewed by police, but efforts are under way to contact the juveniles for interviews, Heffernan wrote
